# The apostles of Jesus

- Matthew 10::2-4 Now the names of the twelve apostles are these;
  - Simon, who is called Peter,
  - Andrew his brother;
  - James the son of Zebedee,
  - John his brother;
  - Philip,
  - Bartholomew (Nathaniel);
  - Thomas,
  - Matthew the publican;
  - James the son of Alphaeus, and
  - Lebbaeus, whose surname was Thaddaeus (Judas, Jude);
  - Simon the Canaanite, (The zealot)
  - Judas Iscariot, who also betrayed him. >> replaced by >> Matthias

#### Matthew 10

[5] These twelve Jesus sent forth, and commanded them, saying, Go not into the way of the Gentiles, and into any city of the Samaritans enter ye not: [6] But go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel.


#### Luke.10

[1] After these things the Lord appointed other seventy also, and sent them two and two before his face into every city and place, whither he himself would come.

#### Matthew 28

- [**16**] Then the eleven disciples went away into Galilee, into a mountain where Jesus had appointed them.
- [17] And when they saw him, they worshipped him: but some doubted.[18] And Jesus came and spake unto them, saying, All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth.
- [19] Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost:



# Roman Empire 116AD




# Where did Peter go?




#### • 1Peter1

- [1] Peter, an apostle of Jesus Christ, to the strangers scattered throughout Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia, and Bithynia, [2] Elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father,
- Acts 16 Paul stopped in some areas
  - [6] Now when they had gone throughout Phrygia and the region of Galatia, and were forbidden of the Holy Ghost to preach the word in Asia, [7] After they were come to Mysia, they assayed to go into Bithynia: but the Spirit suffered them not.
    - [8] And they passing by Mysia came down to Troas.


- Acts 2:14-41 Peter spreads the Good News in Jerusalem on the Day of Pentecost in 30AD. Three thousand who hear his message become believers.
- Acts 3:1-4:22 Peter heals a lame man at the Beautiful Gate of the Temple. He and John are arrested by the temple guards and told not to preach.
- Acts 5:1-16 As the leader of the church in Jerusalem over the next few years, Peter rebukes Ananias and Sapphira when they lie about the money they have received from selling some land.
- Acts 5:17-42 Peter is the spokesperson when he and another apostle are arrested in Jerusalem.
- Acts 8:14-24 Peter and John go to Sebaste in Samaria in 35AD and pray for the new Samaritan believers to be filled with the Holy Spirit
- Acts 8:25 They return to Jerusalem, sharing their message en route in many villages in Samaria




- Acts 9:32-35 Later in the year, Peter visits the believers in Lydda (called Lod in the Old Testament) He heals Aeneas who has been bedridden for eight years. Lod, today, is the site of Tel Aviv's international airport.
- Acts 9:36-43 Peter is called to the port of Joppa where Tabitha ('Dorcas' in *Greek*), one of the believers, has died. Peter prays for her, and the dead woman comes back to life.
- Acts 10:1-8 Cornelius
  - a God-fearing centurion
  - belongs to the Italian Cohort based at the Roman administrative centre in **Caesarea** –
  - has a vision of an angel who tells him to send for Peter in Joppa.




- Acts 10:9-23 Peter
  - praying on the flat roof of Simon the Tanner's house in Joppa –
  - also has a vision in which he is told not to call anything 'unclean' that God has made 'clean'.
  - Cornelius's two Gentile servants and his attendant arrive at Joppa.
- Acts 10:23-48 35AD -
  - Peter travels to Caesarea
  - shares the Good News of Jesus's death and resurrection with Cornelius's Gentile family and friends.
  - The Holy Spirit falls on all present and the six Jewish believers from **Joppa** (see Acts 11:12)
  - The new Gentile believers are baptized.
- Acts 11:1-18 Peter reports back to the Jewish believers in Jerusalem



- Acts 12:1-19 44AD.
  - Peter is arrested in **Jerusalem** during the Passover festival on the orders of King Herod Agrippa I,
  - he has recently beheaded the apostle James, the brother of John.
  - Peter is miraculously freed from prison during the night by an angel.
- He hands over the leadership of the Jerusalem church to James (the brother of Jesus – see Galatians 1:19) and flees elsewhere for safety.
- Acts 15:1-21 49/50AD Jerusalem council Peter addresses the assembly of believers.
- **Gal. 2:11-14** 50AD
  - Peter meets Paul in **Antioch** in, shortly after the Council of **Jerusalem**.
  - Conflict regarding eating with Gentiles.



- 1 Cor. 1:12 56AD, some believers in Corinth claim to follow Peter, while others claim to follow Paul or Apollos.
  - Peter may, have escaped to **Corinth** between 44 and 49AD.
  - Also thought to have preached in Asia Minor
    - Bithynia, Galatia, Pontus, Cappadocia
    - Accompanied by his wife Perpetua
- Some believe Peter went to Britain for some time (Cave's"Antiquitates")



- 1 Pet. 1:1 66AD,
  - Peter writes from Rome to the Jewish believers (strangers) in the Roman provinces of Asia Minor -Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia an d Bithynia.
- 2 Pet. 1:14-15 In 67AD, Peter writes again from Rome, where he has been imprisoned and is about to be executed.
  - Saint Peter's Basilica in the Vatican is supposedly built on top of St. Peter's tomb
  - Another view is that Pope Vitalian sent the bones of Peter and Paul to Britain in 656 AD
