



This Series of Servies is about Evidence.

- How do we know?
- Can we be sure?
- Can we trust the information presented to us?

The evidence we use to justify conclusions that we reach can be based on different criteria, and can satisfy different levels of scrutiny.

- Evidence that satisfies our inward understanding, independently of any other evidence, to our personal satisfaction.
- Evidence which through a mixture of physical events and an inward conviction satisfy an issue beyond reasonable doubt.
- Evidence through observable physical events that provide a basis for proof of the issue beyond all doubt

Today we are talking about evidence of God's presence in our lives.

Who was Agrippa?

At the time of Jesus' birth Herod the Great (37-4BC) ruled the whole

coloured area as a puppet king under the Romans. Upon his death the kingdom was divided to be ruled by his 3 sons.

Agrippa II mentioned here was the great grandson of Herod the Great by a different marriage.

He ruled from 44-66AD. He began to reign at age 17. At first, he had limited power, but this grew over time.

He was educated in Rome and was considered an Hellenistic Jew. He supported some Jewish teaching but was mostly subject to Rome.

- Porcius Festus was a Roman procurator, succeeding Antonius
 Felix somewhere between AD 55 and 60. Festus was governor for only two or three years before he died.
- Josephus had favorable things to say about Porcius Festus. He recorded that Festus took action to solve a problem with Sicarii bandits who were disturbing the peace. He also allowed the Jews to petition Nero regarding a wall they had built to stop Agrippa and the Roman soldiers viewing activities in the Temple.
- In a way, Porcius Festus was to Paul what Pontius Pilate was to Jesus. He valued peace with the Jews more than justice and, despite determining his prisoner was innocent, sent him to judgment. In his quest for political control, Festus dismissed Paul's situation as a "dispute . . . about their own religion" (Acts 25:19). At one point when Paul was speaking before Agrippa, "Festus interrupted Paul's defense. 'You are out of your mind, Paul!' he shouted. 'Your great learning is driving you insane'" (Acts 26:24).

Who was Paul? AD 5-67

- Initially trained as a Pharisee and proud of his Jewish tradition he persecuted the first generation of Christians mercilessly.
- After his miraculous conversion he was compelled to struggle to establish his own worth and authority.
- He also had many enemies and detractors, and his contemporaries probably did not accord him as much respect as they gave Peter and James.
- In time he became a major figure within the very small Christian movement and now is possibly considered the most important person after Jesus in the history of Christianity.
- His surviving letters have had enormous influence on subsequent Christianity and secure his place as one of the greatest religious leaders of all time.

Who was Paul? AD 5-67

- A. D. 5 (btwn 6BC & 10AD) Saul is born in Tarsus.
- A. D. 18
 - Trained under Gamaliel.
- A. D. 36
 - Stoning of Stephen and the conversion of Saul of Tarsus.
- A. D. 36-45
 - Visited various sites in Syria and Cilicia, and 2 visits to Jerusalem.
- A. D. 46-49
 - Paul's first missionary journey.
- A. D. 50
 - Paul's third visit to Jerusalem.
 (Council at Jerusalem).
- A. D. 50-53
 - Paul's second missionary journey.
- A. D. 54
 - Paul's fourth visit to Jerusalem.
- A. D. 54-57
 - Paul's third missionary journey.
- A. D. 58-60
 - Paul visits Jerusalem for the 5th

- time, before Pentecost. He is arrested in the temple—brought before Ananias and the Sanhedrim—sent by Lysias to Caesarea, where he is 'kept in bonds' for two years.
- A. D. 60
 - Paul heard by Felix and Festus. He appeals unto Caesar -preaches before Agrippa, Bernice, and the men of Caesarea.
 - [Autumn] Paul sails for Italy.[Winter] Shipwrecked at Malta.
- A. D. 61-62
 - [Spring] Arrives at Rome—stays two years in his own hired house.
- A. D. 63
 - [Spring] Paul acquitted and released so takes another journey.
- A. D. 64-67
 - Paul arrested and sent to Rome.
 Deserted and solitary.
- A. D. 67
 - Paul's martyrdom.

Acts 26:1-21

26 Then Agrippa said unto Paul, Thou art permitted to speak for thyself. Then Paul stretched forth the hand, and answered for himself:

²I think myself happy, king Agrippa, because I shall answer for myself this day before thee touching all the things whereof I am accused of the Jews: ³Especially because I know thee to be expert in all customs and questions which are among the Jews: wherefore I beseech thee to hear me patiently.

⁴ My manner of life from my youth, which was at the first among mine

own nation at Jerusalem, know all the Jews; ⁵ Which knew me from the beginning, if they would testify, that after the most straitest sect of our religion I lived a Pharisee.

⁶ And now I stand and am judged for the hope of the promise made of God, unto our fathers:

⁷ Unto which promise our twelve tribes, instantly serving God day and night, hope to come. For which hope's sake, king Agrippa, I am accused of the Jews. ⁸ Why should it be thought a thing incredible with you, that God should raise the dead? ⁹ I verily thought with myself, that I ought to do many things contrary to the name of Jesus of Nazareth.

¹⁰ Which thing I also did in Jerusalem: and many of the saints did I shut up in prison, having received authority from the chief priests; and when they were put to death, I gave my voice against them.

¹¹ And I punished them oft in every synagogue, and compelled them to blaspheme; and being exceedingly mad against them, I persecuted them even unto strange cities. ¹² Whereupon as I went to Damascus with authority and commission from the chief priests,

¹³ At midday, O king, I saw in the way a light from heaven, above the brightness of the sun, shining

round about me and them which journeyed with me. ¹⁴ And when we were all fallen to the earth, I heard a voice speaking unto me, and saying in the Hebrew tongue, Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou me? it is hard for thee to kick against the pricks.

And I said, Who art thou, Lord? And he said, I am Jesus whom thou persecutest. ¹⁶ But rise, and stand upon thy feet: for I have appeared unto thee for this purpose, to make thee a minister and a witness both of these things which thou hast seen, and of those things in the which I will appear unto thee; ¹⁷ Delivering thee from the people, and from

the Gentiles, unto whom now I send thee, ¹⁸ To open their eyes, and to turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins, and inheritance among them which are sanctified by faith that is in me.

¹⁹ Whereupon, O king Agrippa, I was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision: ²⁰ But shewed first unto them of Damascus, and at Jerusalem, and throughout all the coasts of Judaea, and then to the Gentiles, that they should repent and turn to God, and do works meet for repentance.

- ²¹ For these causes the Jews caught me in the temple, and went about to kill me.
- of God, I continue unto this day, witnessing both to small and great, saying none other things than those which the prophets and Moses did say should come:
- ²³ That Christ should suffer, and that he should be the first that should rise from the dead, and should shew light unto the people, and to the Gentiles.

- ²⁹ And Paul said, I would to God, that not only thou, but also all that hear me this day, were both almost, and altogether such as I am, except these bonds.
- 30 And when he had thus spoken, the king rose up, and the governor, and Bernice, and they that sat with them:
- ³¹ And when they were gone aside, they talked between themselves, saying, This man doeth nothing worthy of death or of bonds.

Then said Agrippa unto Festus, This man might have been set at liberty, if he had not appealed unto Caesar.
